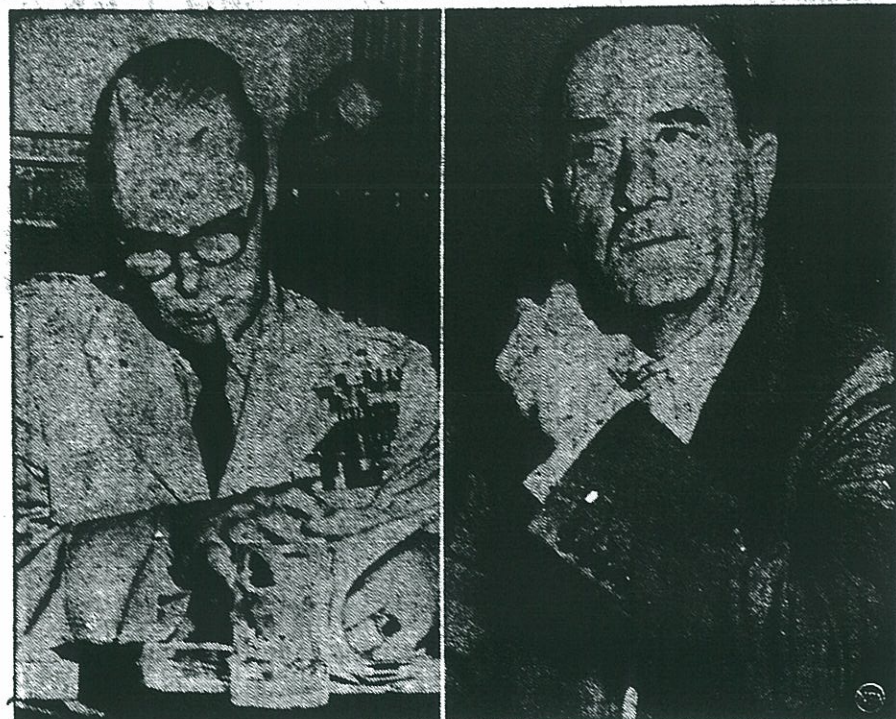

Reds' Answer To Truce Offer Is Kept Secret

UN Negotiators Call Recess And Rush Communist Reply To Washington; South Korean Delegate Again Boycotts Session

PANMUNJOM, Korea—(U.P.)—Communist armistice negotiators gave the United Nations a formal counter-proposal for ending the Korean war "extraordinarily" close to the latest Allied plan, a source close to the U.N. truce team said today.

PANMUNJOM, Korea—(U.P.)—The Communists replied today to the "final" Allied plan to end the Korean war and the United Nations called a one-day truce recess and rushed the Red text to Washington.

Newsman peering through the windows of the truce hut watched North Korean Gen. Nam Il read the text for 63 minutes at the resumption of armistice talks following a nine-day recess.

When Nam had finished, reporters saw Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison's lips move for about three minutes but they could not hear what the chief United Nations chief negotiator was saying.

Powerful Atomic Explosion Closes Series Of Tests

Blast Today Probably Was Strongest Set Off In U. S.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (U.P.)—The Atomic Energy Commission ended its spring test series today with an atomic explosion that was probably the most powerful ever set off in the United States.

The brilliant fireball of the blast lit up the western sky from southern Canada to Mexico and from the skyscrapers of San Francisco to Colorado.

The shock rattled windows in Los Angeles, and hit Modesto, Calif., with a rumble that one radio announcer said "sounded like someone trying to break down the front door with a sledgehammer."

The AEC acknowledged that one of the Air Force's intercontinental B-36 bombers, the first plane designed specifically as an (Continued on Page 6, Col. 7.)

Also Says He Will Not Risk General War

President And Members Of Cabinet Present TV Forum

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower assured the nation last night his administration will neither tolerate a "new Munich" nor risk a "general war" in its effort to achieve an honorable peace in Korea and the world.

In an unprecedented television report from the White House, Mr. Eisenhower sought to put his countrymen at ease regarding American policy in the current critical armistice negotiations at Panmunjom.

He said bluntly he would not be a party to appeasing communism. At the same time, he vowed his resistance to an expanded war "because a modern war would be too horrible to contemplate."

The President offered these sober thoughts as he made his debut as moderator of a folksy, discussion of government problems in which four of his cabinet officers served as a supporting cast.

Wearing pancake makeup and a pastel shirt preferred by TV directors to conventional white, the President handled himself with the ease and confidence of a professional performer as he masterminded his forum for 27 minutes over all TV networks. The show was simulcast or rebroadcast later

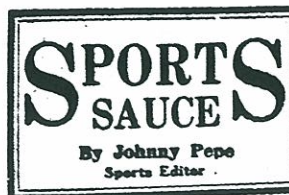

Bill Murphy, the owner of the Sharon Hotel and a man long interested in Little League and Junior League baseball, has proposed a suggestion to insure the future of the youngster competition. Murphy has finally brought into the open what everyone has been thinking for a long time.

He believes the Little Leagues should set up some sort of a commission to handle the overall youngster baseball picture in the Shenango Valley. It is a must on the future activities of the circuits.

Little League and Junior League baseball must be tied in together, if we are to have a flourishing competitive activity. As things now stand, the weakness of the program is in the sponsorship of Junior League baseball. Worthwhile men have taken hold but insist the activity has not been expanded to its proper level.

Little League officials certainly have done a marvelous job in promoting their sphere and no one can blame them if they feel they have their hands full handling their particular job. But the Junior League program must be propelled because of the necessity of absorbing the graduates of the LL.

Would Be Natural

Because of their experience and knowledge of the overall baseball structure and the players involved it would be a natural for LL officials to expand their activities and set up a commission. The work of the commission would be to coordinate all activities of the two younger circuits. They would also be the final authority.

Like the kingdom that was lost for want of a horse-shoe nail, the Browns, for lack of a little punch at the right time, are struggling along at a .432 pace with 19 wins and 25 losses, whereas they'd be at .522 and .727 if they could just have turned around those 13 one-run reverses. That would be two full games ahead of the current Yankee standing of 29-11.

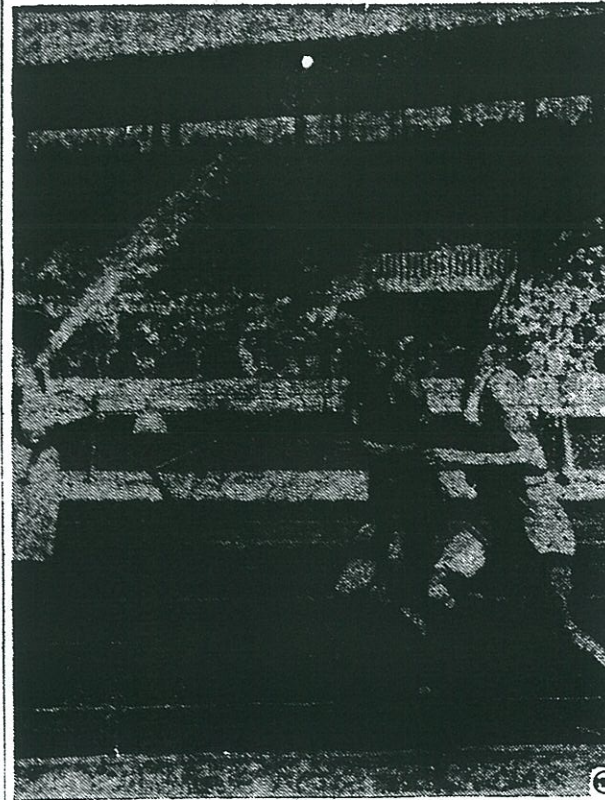

They pounded out the biggest total of runs scored by a major league team this year in drubbing their most persistent rivals, the White Sox, 18-2 with 19 hits Wednesday. In other American League games the Red Sox came from behind to defeat the Indians 4-3 and Philadelphia defeated Detroit, 10-7.

Milwaukee, which is also getting some runaway notions, made it two in a row over Brooklyn with a 14-9 clubbing in the National. The Pirates handed poor Warren Hacker his ninth defeat against one victory, 1-0, while the Giants edged Cincinnati 11-3 and the Cards topped the Phils 5-3, then lost 6-5.

The Yankees were merciless. Every starter drove in at least one run except Phil Rizzuto and he sniped two doubles and scored twice. Mickey Mantle drove in four runs, two on bases loaded walks, one of an infield out. Joe Collins hit four singles to lead that department.

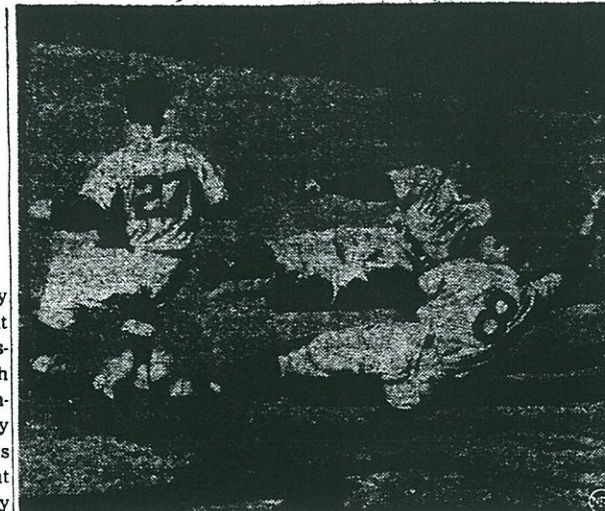

The Cubs have never lessened their interest in Ralph Kiner who has led or tied for the major league home run production since he broke into the big show with the Pirates as a rookie in 1946.

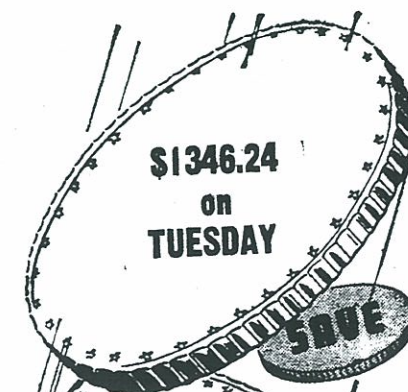
