Farrell School Tax Hiked To Balance Budget

Two-Mill Boost To Bring Real Estate Levy Up To 30

The Farrell Board of Education has adopted tentatively a \$956,813 budget for the 1952-53 school year and has been forced to increase property tax to balance it.

The board set the real estate millage for the year at 30, restoring the two mills that it cut off the levy for the 1952-53 school year.

The new budget is \$1,312,422 higher than the one for the current year which ends on July 1.

Major capital appropriations listed are: \$12,000 for the construction of a men's comfort station at the athletic field, a \$5000 hike over the \$7000 which had been provided in the last budget; \$20,500 for the erection of a fire tower at the Eckles School, a project the state has demanded; \$30,000 for water-proofing the senior high school.

Legislature Is No Closer To Tax Solution

Lawmakers Trying To Escape Another Forced Adjournment

HARRISBURG — (U.P.) — Republican legislative leaders today conceded they were no nearer solution of the Commonwealth's fiscal problems than when the General Assembly organized last January.

Returning from a one-week recess, the lawmakers were also faced with the problem of how to escape another forced recess after this week's session—possibly until July 8.

House Republicans will caucus today in a desperate attempt to break the stalemate over taxes—but the absenteeism which cancelled yesterday's tax caucus may force another postponement on a decision on how to raise \$118,000,000 to balance Gov. John S. Fine's \$1,428,000,000 budget for the 1953-55 biennium.

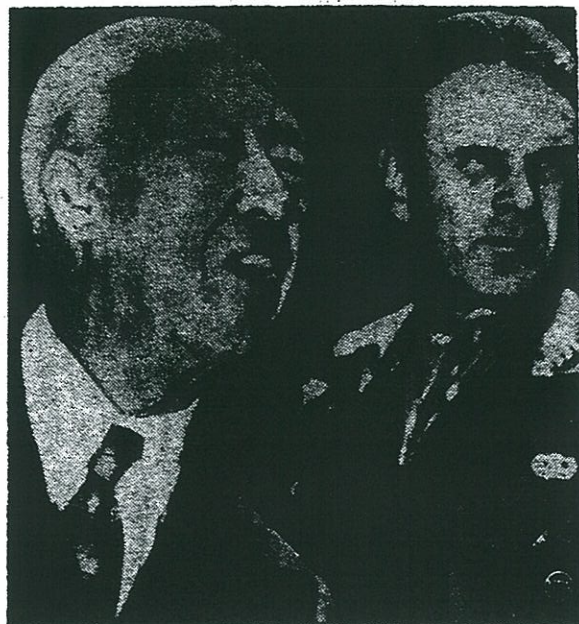
Meanwhile GOP representatives will take up "Little Hoover Committee" recommendations passed by the Senate and now up for final passage in the House.

Cleveland Digs Out In Wake Of Tornado

City Is One Of Largest Ever Hit By A Twister

CLEVELAND — (U.P.) — The death toll continues to mount in the wake of the tornado that ripped through the city of Cleveland.

The latest reports are that at least nine persons died and more than 300 were injured as one of the largest cities ever to be hit by a tornado digs itself out of the wreckage.

Police have thus far counted eight dead in wrecked homes from last night's 100-mile per hour winds. A ninth victim was recorded this morning when Jack Chambers was electrocuted by a fallen power wire.

The father of three-month-old Danny Balint said the "wind tore the baby right out of my hands." The child was dashed against a garage five houses away and was the first identified victim of the tornado in Cleveland.

Greatest Loss Of Life Is In Flint District

Nine Cleveland Residents Among Victims Of One Of Worst Twisters In Past 50 Years; Hundreds Of Persons Injured

FLINT, Mich. — (U.P.) — The death toll mounted to 143 today as eastern Michigan and northwestern Ohio dug out from the shambles of one of the nation's deadliest tornado disasters in 50 years.

Michigan counted 124 dead and Ohio 19, with more bodies being found hourly in both states. Hundreds were injured.

Hardest-hit by the series of twisters which buzz-sawed without warning through the heavily-populated region at dusk Monday was the Beecher metropolitan district immediately north of Flint, where 109 bodies had been recovered.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams declared martial law in the Flint area and called in the National Guard to assist state and local law officers. The Red Cross sent out an urgent appeal for blood donors.

The death toll already exceeded that of last month's twister at San Angelo and Waco, Tex., where 123 died, and was one of the worst in this country in 50 years. Only three other storms caused greater fatalities — a series of tornadoes in Alabama in 1932 which killed 268, one in March of last year which killed 232 in six southern states, and one in the Higgins, Tex.-Woodward, Okla., area in 1947 which killed 167.

In addition to the dead here, three persons were killed in nearby Columbiaville and 12 more elsewhere in Michigan, bringing the state's death toll to 124. Nineteen persons lost their lives in Ohio, nine in Cleveland alone.

More than 1000 carloads of movie goers were gathered at the North Flint Drive-In Theater when the twister struck just as the first show began.

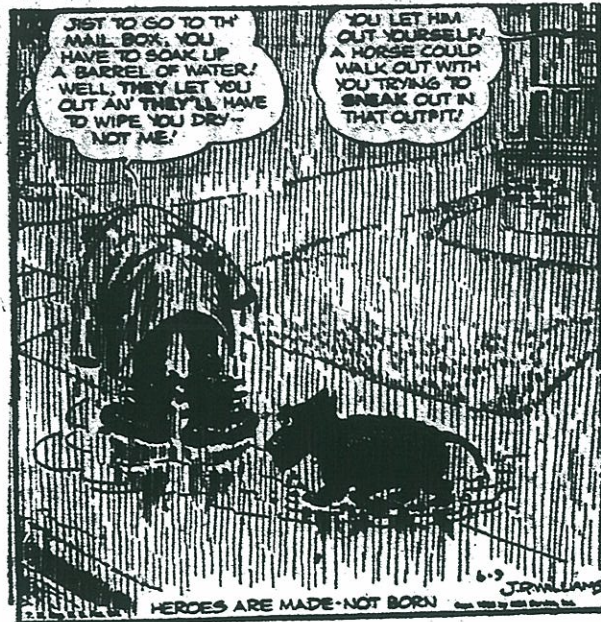
100-Mile-An-Hour Winds Flatten Area At 7:15 P. M.

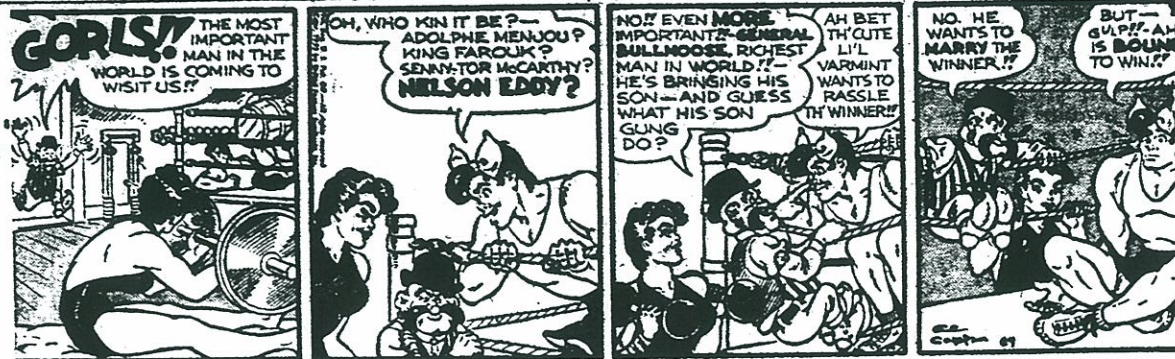

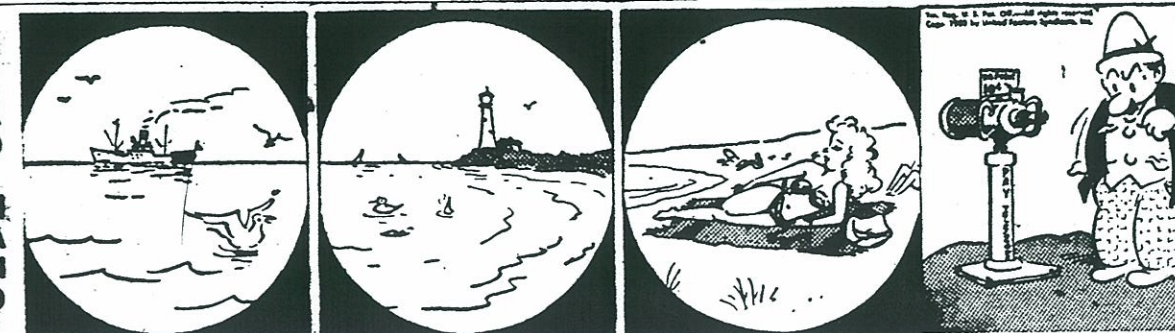

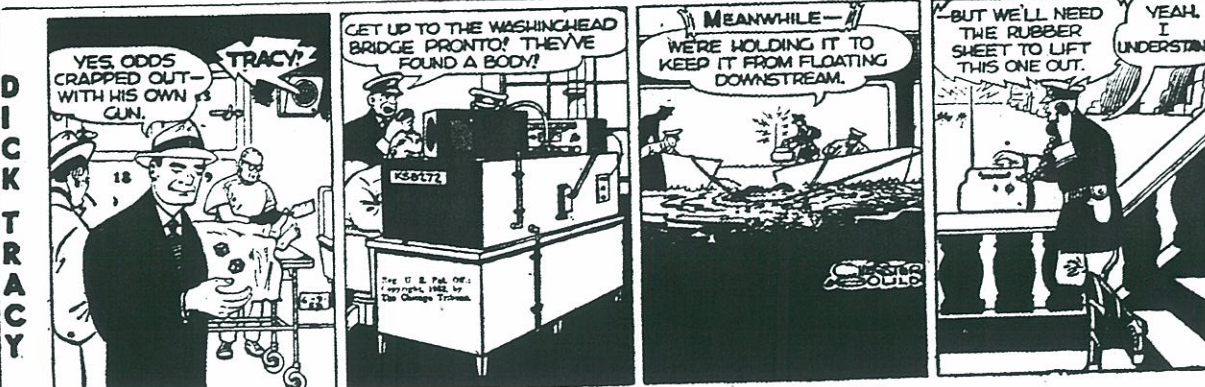

Former Sharonite Receives Doctorate

Walton L. Woody of Cleveland, former Sharonite who is vice president of operations of National Malleable and Steel Castings Co., has been awarded an honorary doctorate from his alma mater, Rose Polytechnic Institute, Terre Haute, Ind.

The former manager of Malleable's Sharon plant was granted a doctor of engineering degree in recognition for his engineering achievements and industrial leadership. He was nominated for the honor by the national council of Tau Beta Pi, the engineers' honorary scholastic society.

Harold H. Johnson, 897 Forker Blvd., who is chief metallurgist at the South Dock St. works and a 1923 graduate of Rose Polytechnic, was among the main speakers at the graduation. He greeted seniors on behalf of the alumni, speaking on the subject, "Where Do We Go From Here?"

Mr. Woody was graduated from the institute in 1914 and later entered service with National Malleable in the chemical laboratory of the Indianapolis plant. He established the chemical laboratory at the Cleveland works and was made assistant superintendent there in 1920. From then until 1925, when he became acting manager, he developed and directed the firm's foundry technical training course. In addition to being manager of the Sharon plant, he also was head of operations at the Chicago and Melrose Park, Ill., facilities during the

J. & L. Miners Return To Jobs

CALIFORNIA, Pa. (U.P.) — Some 3500 miners returned to work yesterday at Vesta 4 and Vesta 5 mines of the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corp., ending a walkout protesting personnel furloughs.

The miners walked out last Monday after the company announced 480 miners would be laid off because of an over-supply of coal. About 1600 Vesta four workers voted Sunday to end the strike. Vesta 5 miners voted last Thursday to return to their jobs.

The company said it had offered the furloughed miners jobs in its mills.
