

CIO Launches Attack Against Administration

Scores White House
For Rejecting Edel-
man For Labor Dept.

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The CIO launched a full scale assault against the Eisenhower administration today for refusing to appoint its candidate to a top post in the Labor Department.

The CIO released two letters from CIO President Walter P. Reuther to presidential assistant Sherman Adams charging the White House with "appealing immoral political forces" in failing to nominate CIO official John W. Edelman to be assistant secretary of labor.

Union officials published the letters, dated May 3 and June 9, after it became apparent that the CIO would be frozen out of its traditional post in the department. The letters carried the sharpest CIO attack on the administration to date.

President Eisenhower's choices for the two of the three assistant secretary jobs in the department—Harrison C. Harb, assistant grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Spencer Miller Jr., New Jersey roads commissioner, were approved Tuesday by the Senate Labor Committee. The third post has been offered to businessman M. M. Glander of the Owens-Illinois Glass Co.

A CIO spokesman said Reuther had not received an official reply to his letters but union officials were convinced their candidate had been rejected once and for all. This is the first time the CIO has publicly stated.

Hickory Disposal Plant Plans Ready

State Health Dept.
OK Is Awaited

Plans for Hickory Township's sewage disposal plant will be sent to Harrisburg this week for consideration by the Pennsylvania Department of Health, Charles King, chairman of the township supervisors, said today.

The plans, drawn up by Township Engineer Joseph Harris, call for the plant to be erected on land purchased from Michael Krivosh on the West Middlesex bypass. The plant will have a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons daily.

The proposed facilities will serve that part of the township immediately east of Wheatland, Farrell and Sharon, north as far as Buhl Farm and east to Hermitage. Cost of installation of the treatment plant and trunk lines will be charged to a sewer authority made up of members who are residents of that part of the township being serviced, Mr. King added.

It is estimated that the facilities will service between 60 and 70 per cent of the homes in the township.

Property owners will be assessed for the expense of installing lines in front of houses. All those living in the area served will have to connect with the system and do away with their septic tanks, the official said.

Fire Damages Room At Prospect School

Between \$400 and \$500 damage was done when a fire broke out in Prospect Heights School about 2 o'clock this morning.

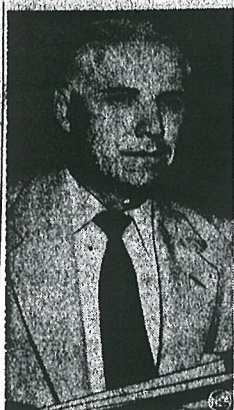
Sharon firemen, who extinguished the flames in less than 45 minutes, reported that damage was confined to one ground level window frame and the ceiling immediately above it.

Although the cause was not determined, officials theorized that the blaze may have been started from a discarded match. No one was in the building at the time the fire was noticed by neighboring residents.

Ken's Boating Bill Is Passed By Lower House

Disputed Pymatuning
Proposal Now Goes
To State Senate

The state House of Representatives at Harrisburg last night passed the Kent bill opening the upper section of Pymatuning Reservoir to motorboats.

The vote was 203 to 2. Mercer County's two members of the House split over the issue. Rep. Ralph J. Down, Sharon Republican, was joined by Rep. J. P. Moran, Allegheny County Democrat, in opposing the bill but Rep. Edward M. Young, Republican, Grove City, voted with the majority.

The measure now goes to the state Senate for concurring action.

Sponsored by Rep. Robert F. Kent, Meadville Republican, the measure extends the area over which motorboats may operate to include the lake region from the Andover, O., causeway northward to Pennsylvania Railroad tracks running south from Lineweave. Boats presently are limited to the lake south of the causeway.

Before calling up the measure for a final vote, Kent amended the bill to write into it a provision permitting the use of motorboats in excess of six horsepower on the reservoir if equipped with approved governors.

The amendment removed from the bill an eight mile per hour speed limit on motorboats which it originally contained. An administrative directive now bans boats in excess of the six horsepower limit unless equipped with the stops.

In the House, the bill was approved without debate. There were no immediate indications how it will fare in the Senate, where Shenango Valley objections to it are now expected to center.

Man Badly Injured In Traffic Mishap

A Sharon man was badly hurt yesterday when his car bounced off a roadside guard rail and rammed head on into an oncoming truck.

Vincent Perisa, 39, of 112 Budd St., was in poor condition in Sharon General Hospital today. He suffered a possible skull fracture, shock, multiple lacerations to his forehead and right arm and chest injuries in the mishap.

Highway patrol officers from Warren, O., said the accident happened early in the afternoon on the Sharon-Youngstown road near the Gray Wolf Tavern at Masury. Perisa apparently lost control of his car, ran off the road and into the guard rail and then veered into the truck, operated by John S. Phillips, 25, of R. D. 2, Mercer, they said.

Phillips was reported uninjured.

Test Of New Polio Vaccine Will Be Held

Meanwhile Inocula-
tions With Gamma
Globulin Continue

Authorities rushed plans today to inoculate more children with gamma globulin as a makeshift defense against polio until a valid test can be made of an unnamed and revolutionary vaccine.

The new vaccine may "solve" the polio problem by providing actual disease prevention rather than gamma globulin's temporary benefits, according to Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

National Foundation spokesmen said that the 100,000th child to receive gamma globulin in the United States would be inoculated sometime during a mass injection program at polio-stricken Decatur, Ill.

The mass inoculations at Decatur and surrounding Macon County in central Illinois are scheduled to begin Friday with 10 clinics established in school buildings.

At Newton, N. C., meantime, the first of 12,000 children lined up for GG injections even though health officials said a polio outbreak that has claimed two lives there seemed to have "reached its peak."

At Decatur Tuesday doctors diagnosed another case of the disease, bringing the total to 15 in the town of about 70,000. Three deaths have been reported.

Protests from anxious mothers at Elmira, N. Y., forced authorities to reopen emergency gamma globulin clinics there after 34,901 children had been inoculated.

The mothers, whose children had failed to receive the serum, brought more than 1000 children to the reopened clinics.

Gamma globulin, a blood derivative, is believed to prevent or lessen the crippling effects of infantile paralysis for about six weeks. Then its effectiveness is lost.

O'Connor's announcement at San Francisco Tuesday was one of the most encouraging statements since health experts began all-out war on polio with (Continued on Page 6, Col. 8.)

Parking meter regulations in the Idaho St. district of Farrell will become effective tomorrow, officials announced today.

The meters are to be effective from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. on Saturdays. The city ordinance calls for fines of \$1 for ordinary violations, but carries a maximum penalty of \$50.

Mossadegh To Seek General Election

TEHRAN, Iran (U.P.)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, overriding the appeal of his supporters in Parliament (Majlis), said today he will ask public support to dissolve the chamber and call general elections.

Mossadegh expressed his determination to take his fight to the people after a three-hour conference with the 30 pro-government deputies who resigned Tuesday night apparently in a move to block further attacks on the premier. The deputies had appealed to Mossadegh to postpone action, at least temporarily.

City Council To Speed Work On \$150,000 Worth Of Its Street And Sewer Program

Sharon city councilmen set up projects to cost more than \$150,000 in the city's street and sewer program last night and called for bids on the projects this month so that they can be completed this summer.

Councilmen authorized the advertisement for bids on new paving work for nine streets and for installation of storm sewers on seven thoroughfares. Included in ordinances passed earlier this year, the paving work costs are to be assessed against property owners. While storm sewer expense is to be assumed by the municipality.

Streets included in this part of the permanent improvement program include Service and Shady Aves. from Pine Hollow

Russia Challenged To Free East Germany And Austria

Assembly Soon To Receive State Appropriation Bill, Trimmed To \$935,000,000

Measure \$45,000,000 Lower Than Original Budget Request Of Governor; Will Reach House Floor Today Or Tomorrow

HARRISBURG (U.P.)—A general appropriation bill of approximately \$935,000,000—reflecting \$45,000,000 in slashes from Gov. John S. Fine's original budget requests—will move through the General Assembly in a few days.

In line with the schedule drive for final adjournment next week, the House Appropriations Committee expects to report to the floor either today or Thursday the bulky bill to cover the normal, fixed cost of government.

A top Republican spokesman said that the bill will not carry, at this time, a proposed salary increase for about 40,000 state employees, since it had not been decided whether they would receive a 5 or 10 per cent boost.

When the decision is reached, an amendment will be inserted by the Senate. The governor, in a message to the legislature on May 27, said he considered a 10 per cent increase "reasonable."

The cuts in appropriations were drafted by Republican legislative leaders and the governor several months ago during the impasse over taxes—which was finally broken last Friday when the legislature cleared the 1 per cent sales tax bill.

Both chambers held lengthy sessions Tuesday to clear legislation through their heavy work calendars.

One controversial bill that passed the House recently may die in a Senate committee.

Sen. G. Graybill Diehm (R-Lancaster), chairman of the State Government Committee, said there is little chance that his group will okay a bill to regulate the underground storage of natural gas near coal mines.

"I doubt that there is a single favorable vote for it in the committee," Diehm said.

The question of revision of the state constitution will be thrown into the lap of a Senate conference committee.

The House Tuesday refused to concur in Senate amendments that knocked out machinery for setting up a constitutional convention and left only a provision for a statewide referendum on the question next November. The Senate, informed of the action, insisted on its amendments.

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower pulled out all the stops today in an effort to check a snow-balling congressional drive to slash his \$5,222,000,000 foreign aid program.

He invited members of a House appropriations subcommittee to the White House for breakfast. He told the whole Senate Appropriations Committee to come around for lunch.

High administration officials revealed that Mr. Eisenhower planned to make a personal appeal against any cuts below the administration's cutback request. The appropriations committees are the storm centers in the economy campaign.

Sen. Styles Bridges (R-N.H.), chairman of the Senate group, got a preview of the President's views at a White House breakfast Tuesday. Before today's lunch, he called a closed committee meeting to let Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther testify "frankly" on the defense short-comings of members of the North Atlantic pact.

Gruenther, new NATO commander, was called to both White House meetings today to bolster the President's position. So also were Mutual Security Director Harold E. Stassen and Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge.

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U. N. Delegates Walk Out On Armistice Talks

Two Sides To Meet
Again On Thursday
In Showdown Session

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower's personal envoy to Korea, returned today with assurances the United States can go ahead with an armistice signing "in good faith" whenever the Communists are ready.

SEUL, Korea (U.P.)—Allied truce delegates walked out on the Communists at Panmunjom today and an informed source said the Reds may be called on to "put up or shut up" at a crucial meeting Thursday.

The walkout apparently resulted from continued Communist claims that the United Nations Command is conspiring with South Korean President Syngman Rhee to break an armistice.

A reliable source said Lt. Gen. William K. Armstrong, chief UN negotiator, gave the Reds some blunt words during their 21-minute meeting in the truce hut.

He said the session at 11 a. m. Thursday (10 p. m. Wednesday EDT) may be the showdown that will decide whether the Communists will sign a truce or not.

Peiping Radio, voice of Communist China, said Harrison and his aides walked out after "unilaterally declaring a recess" but again.

Although Wednesday's discussions were secret, reliable sources said Harrison told the Communists the U. N. has Rhee's pledge to "collaborate" on an armistice and challenged the Reds to sign the truce and "see who makes the first violation."

These informants also said the U. N. accused the Communists of bad faith in deliberately delaying an armistice in order to carry out the crushing Communist offensive on the flaming central front.

Both South Korean President Syngman Rhee and Eighth Army Commander Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor flew to the front for first-hand information on the steam-rolling Chinese drive.

Allied artillery caused widespread carnage among the massed ranks of thousands of Chinese but the Red tide surged on.

A temporary censorship blackout on the eastern front and the confused nature of the fighting resulted in sketchy reports from the blazing central sector.

Only the far western tip of the 20-mile bulge stood fast as massed artillery firing without letup for 24 hours halted the Red offensive there.

The latest Communist offensive struck in an attempt to open the "bulge" sector like a huge door with the hinge located on the western tip of the east of Kunwha near Sniper Ridge where the artillery was containing the Reds.

Newest reports indicated the Communists may have crossed the Kumsong River, swollen by two to three inches of rain, and penetrated the new defense line to an undisclosed depth.

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Sen. Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.) says that chances are "good" for passage of the controversial St. Lawrence Seaway bill this year. The Senate Republican Policy Committee announced that the measure will be brought up before the current Senate session ends.

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower cancelled his weekly news conference today. He was reported to have called off his meeting with reporters because he did not want to discuss the Korean situation until after conferring with Assistant Secretary of State Walter Robertson, his truce envoy, who was scheduled to return here today.

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KEY MAN—William P. Bundy, Central Intelligence Agency official, may be the key figure in a showdown between President Eisenhower and Sen. Joseph McCarthy. McCarthy ordered a subpoena for Bundy in order to question him about his contribution to the Alger Hiss defense fund. The White House is opposed to the subpoena and the questioning of CIA officials for fear of divulging many security secrets.

Continued Attack By Reds Punctures New Allied Line

Thousands Of Tanks,
Trucks And Guns
Abandoned By ROKs

SEUL, Korea (U.P.)—Relentless Chinese Communist infantrymen punctured the new Allied Kumsong River defense line today and smashed southward on a 15-mile front in central Korea.

Front line officers said the Chinese must have thrown new armies into the battle to reinforce eight divisions which mounted the offensive Monday night.

Reports revealed four South Korean divisions which withdrew under the opening impact of the Red drive abandoned thousands of trucks, tanks and guns.

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Big 3 Ministers Invite Reds To Showdown Talks

Also Warn Soviets
Against New Thrusts
In Asia After Truce

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The United States, Britain and France put the Communist world on the defensive today with a challenge to liberate East Germany and Austria and a warning against breaking a Korean truce.

The Big Three foreign ministers, climaxing a momentous five-day conference on Allied problems, announced last night they were inviting Russia to showdown talks on Germany's unification and Austria's independence.

They also declared solemnly that their governments would resume the war in Korea if the Communists violated an armistice. And they warned against any new Red thrust anywhere in Asia after a truce.

These were the highlights of the discussions of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Acting British Foreign Minister Lord Salisbury and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault.

The general feeling was that the decisions gave the Allies the diplomatic initiative just as unrest was sweeping the Soviet empire and reaching into the Kremlin itself.

Diplomats said Russia's answer to the bid for Big Four talks would help decide whether there will be an East-West settlement in Europe and provide a clue to Kremlin policy now that the struggle for power is on in full force.

On Korea, the Big Three pledged to work for a truce while warning that any violation of its terms would bring quick Allied retaliation on the battlefield. They said the Allies, if the Reds renewed their aggression, would "again support the restoration of peace and security." They pledged support for the war against Communism in Indochina.

In Europe, the Big Three likewise stated their determination (Continued on Page 6, Col. 4.)

PITTSBURGH (U.P.)—Four hundred suspended testers at the East Pittsburgh plant of the Westinghouse Electric Corp. will meet Friday to take final action on a strike vote.

The testers were suspended for three days Monday for attending a wage grievance meeting on company time. They are members of Local 601, CIO International Union of Electrical Workers.

A local spokesman said the testers had voted to strike for more money but will meet Friday before walking out.

The IUE is currently negotiating with the corporation on a new wage contract. The union has rejected a wage and pension offer averaging 4 1/2 cents. The offer has been accepted by the United Electrical Workers (Ind.) and the Westinghouse Federation of Independent Salaried Unions.

The IUE represents approximately 47,000 workers in Westinghouse plants.

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Townsend Will Go To Brussels

Name Has Been Linked With Princess

LONDON, (U.P.)—Group Capt. Peter Townsend, 38-year-old divorced father of two children whose name has been linked romantically with Princess Margaret, will leave for Brussels as scheduled today "as far as we know," the Air Ministry said.

A spokesman for the ministry touched off speculation Tuesday night that Townsend would remain here long enough to bid goodbye personally to the 22-year-old princess. Margaret is scheduled to return Friday from a tour of Southern Rhodesia with Queen Mother Elizabeth.

The spokesman then said that Townsend's departure for Brussels where he is to become air attaché at the British Embassy, had been postponed indefinitely. A few hours later the ministry reversed itself and announced Townsend would leave today after all.

"As far as we know," the spokesman said, "Capt. Townsend will leave today for Brussels as scheduled." He said he did not know the reason for the switch.

A reliable court source said that the handsome air hero of the Battle of Britain personally sought the transfer to spare the royal family embarrassment about his presence close to the princess.

Townsend has served for nine years as equerry to the royal family and regular companion and friend to the princess.

The possibility of a marriage of the two has raised a storm of controversy. Princess Margaret is third in line to the throne and marriage to a divorced man would violate the tenets of the Church of England.

Senate Bill Would Cut Police Hours

HARRISBURG (U.P.)—The Senate Local Government Committee has approved a bill cutting the maximum working hours of policemen in third class cities from 36 to 44 hours a week.

As introduced by Sen. Tilghman A. Freed (R-Lehigh), the measure would have cut the work week of policemen to 40 hours but the committee amended it to push the maximum to 44 hours.

Gov. John S. Fine vetoed a 1951 bill which would have made the same reduction in working hours as the one reported to the Senate floor late Tuesday. Fine said at the time of the veto in Jan., 1952, that although he was in sympathy with a move to slash the duty hours of policemen, he was forced to veto it because it would disrupt the budgets of too many cities.

CINCINNATI, O.—Suddenly, the long strong arm of the pitcher emerged today as a greater force than the mighty free swinging guy with the home run bat.

That fourth straight victory by a 5-1, five-hit margin for the National League over the American in the All-Star game proved pretty conclusively that even in this day of the mighty slugger, the peppy ball and the cheap home run, a good pitcher can generally stop a good hitter.

There were no home runs by either side for the first time in the classic since the Nationals beat the Americans, 7-1, in the 1944 game at Pittsburgh. This was especially significant at a time when there are more home runs being hit than in any other season in history to date and when the boundaries at compact Crosley Field were so close they must have left the hitters drooling.

Hold-Upper Hand

But drooling was about all they were able to do as the pitchers held the upper hand all the way. Lefty Warren Spahn of Milwaukee was the winner, but his brilliance was matched by starter Robin Roberts of the Phillies and his lefty teammate, Curt Simmons. The only hurler whom the American Leaguers could fathom at all was Murry Dickson of the Pirates, who yielded a lone run in the ninth after setting them down in order in the eighth.

Roberts pitched the first three innings and gave up one hit, a single by Gus Zernial of the Athletics. Winner Spahn pitched the next two and yielded none. Simmons hurled two and was touched for a single by Minnie Minoso of the White Sox. Zernial's replacement in left field.

Gels In Trouble

While all that was going on, the National Leaguers made their victory official by teeing off on Yankee ace Allie Reynolds. The right handed old man who plagues them annually in the World Series got himself in trouble with two outs in the fifth when he hit Ed Mathews of Milwaukee on the foot with a pitch, then walked old warhorse Enos Slaughter of the Cardinals, the game's hitting star.

Richie Ashburn of the Phillies followed with a pinch single and Pee-wee Reese drove in a second run with his first All-Star hit in eight games, a single to right. Slaughter and Reese were the key hitters in later rallying in which the Nationals picked up their final three runs and a solid cushion against the lone American tally in the ninth off Dickson on singles by Ferris Fain of the Athletics, Johnny Mize of the Yankees, and Minoso.

Fourth Straight

Slaughter also stole a base and stabbed a line drive that was labelled for a hit by rookie pinch hitter Harvey Kuenn of Detroit.

Although the victory was the fourth straight for the Nationals, they still trail in the series, 12 games to 8.

Next year's game is scheduled for Cleveland, where the largest crowd in the series' history, 69,812, saw the Americans win the third game, 4-1, back in 1935. Tuesday's crowd was 30,846, a capacity throng for Crosley Field but nevertheless the fourth smallest crowd in the series' history.
