

Arrest Expected In Murder Of Gaspé Hunters

Officials Think
Robbery Was Motive
For Triple Slaying

QUEBEC CITY (U.P.)—Provincial Solicitor General Antoine Rivard said today three American hunters found mutilated in the Gaspé forest were murdered.

Rivard told a press conference that the sweat-shirt of one of the hunters had "traces of a bullet entering at the heart level and coming out at the back," Rivard said.

The remains of two of the hunters were found spread along the bank of a creek by a provincial police search party Thursday. Most of the skeleton of the third was found last week. The men were Eugene Lindsey, 47, his son Robert, 17, and 20-year-old Fred Clair.

Rivard said police developed photographs from the camera of one of the hunters and "these photos helped in the identification of the remains of the bodies."

Four pictures were developed from the camera which was found at the bottom of a small creek near the spot where the remains of the elder Lindsey were found.

One of them showed three Gaspé region men who helped the hunters pull their small truck from the spot where it had stalled, Rivard said.

Rivard, who will direct the department's investigation into the gruesome triple slaying, said "everything at our disposal will be used to find the culprit or culprits."

"Thanks to the searches organized by Sgt. Henry Doyon of the provincial police at Gaspé, this crime came to light," Rivard said, "and it now rests with our (Continued on Page 6, Col. 3.)"

Reds Try To Kidnap Police In W. Berlin

Second Such Incident Is Reported
Within Two Days

BERLIN (U.P.)—West Berlin police today reported another Communist attempt to kidnap a western border patrolman. It was the second such incident in two days and officials believed the Communists have launched a campaign to harass and intimidate West German police.

American authorities, meanwhile rejected as "without basis" a Soviet protest alleging that American planes dropped leaflets "hostile to the Soviet armed forces" over East Germany. The charge was made in an angry note last Friday from Soviet High Commissioner Vladimir S. Semichov to U. S. High Commissioner Dr. James B. Conant.

Eleven members of the German Communist police army, accompanied by a police dog and armed with machineguns, crossed into the British sector of Berlin early today and surrounded two West German police on border patrol, police headquarters said.

The Communists ordered the western police over the border into the Soviet zone. When the western policemen refused, three Communists grabbed one and attempted to drag him across.

The second policeman fired warning shots into the air with his carbine and the Communists retreated hastily back across the Iron Curtain, headquarters reported.

Thursday six armed Communist police crossed into the American sector of the city and attempted to kidnap a two-man western police patrol. A 20-man West Berlin police riot squad chased the Communists back across the border.

Western officials said the crackdown ordered by Justice Minister "Red Hilde" Benjamin on rebellious workers appeared to have borne fruit. Thousands of workers were believed to have been arrested by Communist police in widespread raids.

The officials said they have received no new reports of strikes since the police raids on factories and homes in the roundup of strike leaders and anti-Communists.

Legislature Plans Session Next Week

Leaders Expect To
Adjourn By Tuesday

HARRISBURG (U.P.)—Republican legislative leaders, faced with last-minute "must" legislation requiring compromise, set a new goal of final adjournment for next Monday—or Tuesday.

The plan to wind up the session by Saturday was junked when it became apparent more time would be needed for study of amendments to the controversial House reapportionment bill.

The Senate, by a 47-3 vote, passed and sent to the House for concurrence the revisions it made in the legislation to reshuffle the seats of the House.

The new version was quickly put into the hands of a Senate-House conference committee—a move that will give the Justice Department another opportunity to study it for constitutionality. Lawmakers remember that a 1937 restructuring bill was declared unconstitutional because a western Pennsylvania district had been omitted.

The House, meanwhile, tabled another amendment to the sine die adjournment date from Saturday to Monday at 3 p. m. House leaders said they were holding it up until the (Continued on Page 6, Col. 4.)

Mr. Flaugh suffered a fractured skull and a broken arm. His son, Rocky, 9, has regained consciousness but is in serious condition with a fractured skull. St. Francis Hospital also listed Mrs. Flaugh as in serious condition with a fractured hip. Mrs. Flaugh is a nurse at Greenville Hospital.

Their teen-age daughter, Beatrice, was in the accident, having remained in Albuquerque, N. M., to visit Mr. and Mrs. John Campbell, former Greenville residents.

Mrs. Bertha Herron of Greenville also had accompanied the Flaughs on their vacation trip to the West but had remained in Albuquerque with the Campbells, her son-in-law and daughter.

Details of the accident were not available.

City officials said today that the Baker firm would have a proposal to present to council at the Tuesday night session. This would give officials an idea of what the survey would cost and what would be involved in the street installation as well as improvement of the large lot behind the F. H. Buhl Club for free parking.

Envoy Continues Talks In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (U.P.)—Milton S. Eisenhower, President Eisenhower's brother, and his special good-will envoy to Latin America, continues his talks today with top Brazilian government leaders.

Eisenhower is on the final leg of his 10-nation tour of South America. He conferred Thursday for 40 minutes with President Getulio Vargas, U. S. Assistant Secretary of State John M. Cabot, who is accompanying Eisenhower, attended the meeting.

Chinese Pour Heavy Artillery On Allied Posts

No Apparent Reason
For Barrage Against
'Cease Fire' Line

SEOUL, Korea (U.P.)—Thunderous Communist artillery barrages hit American positions today along the "cease fire" line already fixed and approved at Panmunjom.

There was no apparent reason for the assault on territory that will be the property of neither side after the armistice has been signed.

Chinese Communists mounted bloody attacks on the western and central fronts in the half-light of a half moon.

The Reds took four outposts along the central front but South Koreans regained one of the positions in a counter attack at dawn.

A reinforced battalion of about 800 men also knocked ROK troops off two other outposts overlooking the Kumsong River, but the South Koreans returned to the crest of one of them in bitter hand-to-hand fighting.

Communist artillery laid down a heavy barrage on the western front before Red troops struck at Dale and Westview hills which are situated between Porkchop and Old Baldy, guardians of the main invasion route to Seoul.

The attack against Dale was repulsed at long range but troops on Westview had to leave their trenches and drive back the Chinese in vicious bayonet and gun-butt fighting.

The furious central front skirmishes were believed to be Chinese attempts to discredit troops praised by South Korean President Syngman Rhee on his visit to the battlefield Thursday.

Clouds obscured the battle-line, but Allied fighter-bombers using electronic instruments hit Red troops in the Kumsong area with 192 tons of bombs.

Progress Reported On By-Pass Plans

With more than a year's work behind them, engineers have almost completed their phase of the Route 62 by-pass of Sharon, spokesmen for the Pennsylvania Department of Highways said today.

But, they added, the multi-million dollar project, still has a long way to go in the paper stages before the first ground is turned. Declining to pinpoint a completion date even for preliminary work, the highway officials noted that some of the toughest problems have been solved, but there are still such matters pending as approval by local government officials of minor revisions, agreement by the Public Utility Commission of work that involves grade crossings and lastly, financing.

The engineers, who have been working closely with the department's approval, have just about cleared one of the highest hurdles in the junction with Route 62 so that the by-pass ties in with the new highway that is being straightened from the curve at South Irvine Ave. to just east of Hubbard.

UN Preparing For Assembly Session To Approve Truce

Will Set Date And
Site For Conference
After Armistice

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U.P.)—United Nations officials rushed preparations today for a General Assembly session to approve the expected Korean armistice and to make plans for the Far Eastern political conference scheduled to follow it.

General Assembly President Lester B. Pearson arrived Thursday night from Canada for a weekend of conferences with Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld and other U. N. officials.

The two top U. N. officials were scheduled to meet leading delegates from a dozen nations, including the United States, Russia, Britain, France and India, at luncheon in Pearson's honor here today.

Hammarskjöld flew to Ottawa last month to open talks with Pearson on plans for the post-armistice Assembly session.

Observers believed the Assembly would be called back from its recess, which started April 23, within three weeks of the signing of an armistice agreement.

The 60-nation group is expected only to "take note" of the truce after the unified command has notified the Security Council that it has been signed.

Then the Assembly will turn its attention to the Far Eastern political conference scheduled to follow within 90 days of the signing of the armistice. Observers considered it unlikely that the Assembly would attempt to fix the agenda for the conference. It was expected only to set the actual date, select the site, and perhaps decide what countries will participate.

South Korean Says Contrary Promises Given

Complains U. S. Told
Him One Thing And
Communists Another

SEOUL, Korea (U.P.)—Syngman Rhee said today assurances reported granted to the Communists will make it impossible for him to keep his pledges to abide by the Korean armistice.

The South Korean president accused the United States of making certain promises to him and giving exactly the opposite pledges to Communist truce negotiators.

If these contrary promises have been made, Rhee said, either he or the Communists will be left holding an "empty bag."

Rhee said, however, he would make every effort to abide by the armistice, the signing of which is believed to be only hours away, until he finds he must use other tactics.

"My desire is strong not to follow a unilateral policy. If it can be avoided," Rhee said.

Rhee's statements of today and Thursday failed to slow the pace of officers making final armistice arrangements at Panmunjom.

The pagoda-shaped building in which the armistice is expected to be signed has been completed, and the chief Swedish representative of the neutral (Continued on Page 6, Col. 2.)

\$200,000,000 Is Sought For Korea

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower today asked that \$200,000,000 of defense funds be used to start post-armistice rehabilitation to South Korea.

Mr. Eisenhower made the request to Republican Congressional leaders at a 90-minute White House breakfast. They said the plan received "very strong approval."

Acting Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland and House Speaker Joseph W. Martin Jr. expressed confidence a majority of both houses in Congress will approve.

Knowland said that the \$200,000,000 would be the first installment of an emergency fund to start rehabilitation and would not necessarily be all that Congress would provide for South Korea in the current fiscal year.

The money, Knowland said, would come out of savings resulting from the end of combat in Korea. He said it was estimated that actual fighting—besides pay and maintenance of U. S. troops, costs about \$1,200,000,000 a year.

Mr. Eisenhower did not give his congressional leaders any estimates on total rehabilitation costs for war-torn Korea.

Knowland said the subject still is under study and the \$200,000,000 would allow a start in the program of rebuilding war-damaged bridges and buildings and of otherwise helping the South Koreans.

The rehabilitation work would start promptly after signing of a truce. Martin said it was hoped the truce would come "soon."

The President's request was made as Syngman Rhee voiced new opposition to the plans for a truce.

Farm Production
Slated To Gain

HARRISBURG—Except for corn, production of all major field crops this year on Pennsylvania farms will be equal to or greater than in 1952, according to initial estimates announced today by Miles Horst, State Secretary of Agriculture, following Federal State acreage and yield surveys.

All field crops except potatoes, tobacco and rye will produce more than their 10-year 1942-51 average, he said.

The Keystone State corn crop, planted on 1,347,000 acres, the same as in 1952, is estimated at 64,656,000 bushels or 1,347,000 bushels higher than the 10-year average, Secretary Horst said. Yield was estimated on July 1 at 48 shelled bushels per acre, 1 less than last year. Much corn was planted late and will need a favorable season to mature.

There was no change in the wheat estimate from June 1 at 20,472,000 bushels, 1,460,000 above 1952. At 24 bushels per acre, yield is 4.5 bushels higher than last year. The 1952 oats crop, from an acreage 3 per cent less than last year, is estimated at 26,352,000 bushels, 4,457,000 higher than in 1952. Yield at 36 bushels per acre is

7 bushels above last year. The rye estimate is for 238,000 bushels, 34,000 above 1952. Acreage is up 17 per cent. Barley acreage is up 5 per cent, production of 5,817,000 bushels being 336,000 bushels higher than last year.

Since Pennsylvania is a leading dairy state, the hay crop is important. Production of 3,594,600 tons from 1 per cent less acreage is 216,000 tons above 1952 and about 60,000 over average.

For the sixth consecutive year the Pennsylvania potato acreage this year will be the lowest ever known. The 60,000 acres planted is a drop of 6 per cent from the previous all-time low last year. Average yield is estimated at the 1950 record of 240 bushels per acre for a total crop of 14,400,000 bushels, the same as in 1952. Last year the tobacco acreage was reduced 30 per cent to 23,500 and this year

it is 5 per cent greater than last year with production estimated at 38,788,000 pounds compared with 36,428,000 pounds in 1952 and the 10-year average of 50,251,000 pounds.

June rains averaged below normal, favoring completion of corn, oats and potato plantings and permitting rapid advance of hay and barley harvest. By July 1, many pastures were drying up and some corn was wilting. Damage from stem rust in wheat, mostly in the southeast, was perhaps above normal. Hay is excellent crop in practically every locality. Buckwheat production estimates are not yet available.

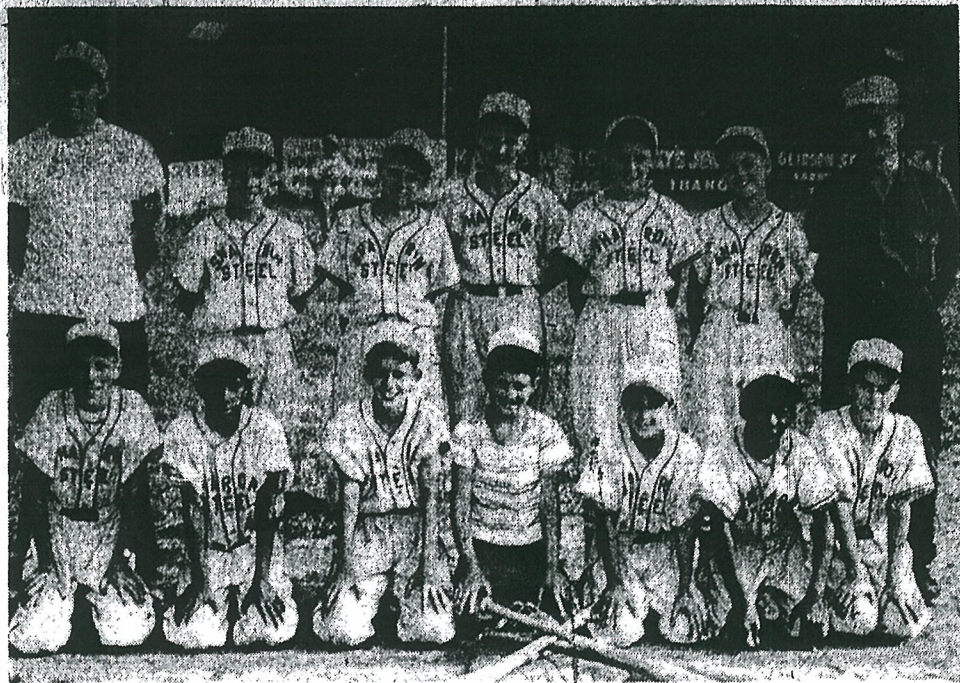

Fairway Shots

HERSHEY — The Hershey Park Public Golf Course, scene of the State Public Links Tournament, is a 6207-yard affair that plays to a par 71, 36 on the front nine and 35 on the back. The Spring Creek waters that supply the main industry of the community, chocolate-making, bisect the course 11 times, making it one of the tougher courses in the state. Two of the greens are three-quarters surrounded by water, making them difficult targets to add to the hazards and the course winds its way up and down the mountainside.

A badly-played shot can wind up in the water or down a hillside costing the unwary at least several strokes. Players in the tournament, in the main, talk about No. 11. It's a par 3 playing 225 yards, all carry. It nestles under a roadway which runs to the left of the green and along the backside and right runs Spring Creek. The tee shot must be all carry and it must be true. An off-line hook carries out of bounds and a push or slice into the creek. A ball that's hit too hard goes over the green and into the creek on the backside. The saving point is that it's a fairly large green with an apron to the right in front.

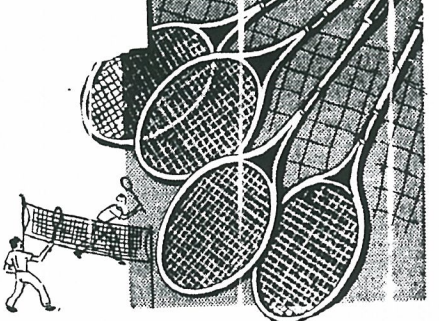

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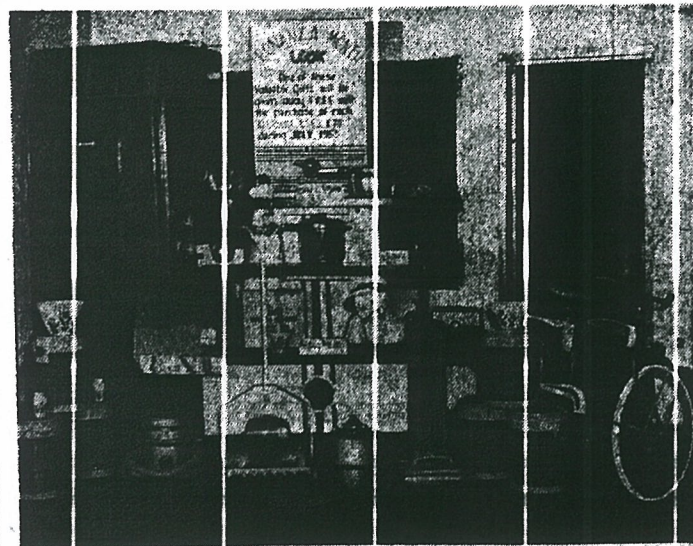


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
