

Westinghouse Proposal Is Ok'd By Union

Workers in Section F-14 To Return To Jobs On Monday

Production at Westinghouse Transformer Division is slated to be resumed at 11:30 p. m. tomorrow as the result of a settlement of a dispute that ultimately involved more than 950 employees.

Production workers in Section F-14 last night unanimously accepted a proposal made yesterday by management to end the dispute over time values that broke out Monday. Although only 137 strikers were directly involved in the stoppage, stalled production caused some 820 others to be furloughed. All are to report for their regular shifts Monday, spokesmen said.

Under terms of the accepted proposal, the six employees originally involved in the dispute will be placed in a separate group on a temporary basis and a time study of their work will be made for the rest of this month. Recorded time values then will be established for the work and if employees are entitled to more pay, it will be made retroactive to July 20, company officials said. Other workers in the section will remain on their regular time values until this study is completed.

The proposal that brought an end to the work stoppage was made during negotiations yesterday morning. IUE-CIO Local 617, which represents shop employees at the Transformer Division, called a special meeting at the union on last night to inform striking F-14 employees of the offer.

Some Of French Workers Go Back To Jobs Today

2,000,000 Take Part In Strike Over Economy Program

PARIS — (U.P.) — Some of the 2,000,000 workers taking part in France's worst strike in 17 years began returning to their jobs today despite Communist pleas to extend the walkout beyond the scheduled end.

But the strike of miners and gas and electric workers was continuing for at least another day and communications were crippled indefinitely. Transportation was still unreliable.

Most Communist unions called on strikers who crippled communications, transportation and essential public services Friday to ignore the agreed midnight deadline and stay on strike, but the Socialist, Catholic and Independent Unions ordered their members to honor the time limit.

The Red effort faced its first setbacks when trains left three of six Paris railroad stations shortly after midnight this morning. At the same time, the transport union bowed to the back-to-work movement on Paris subways and buses.

Strikes throughout France's public services and nationalized industries were called by the Socialist Workers Force (F.O.), the Catholic (C.F.T.C.) and Independent Unions to protest Premier Joseph Laniel's economy program that threatened to cause firings.

The Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor (C.G.T.), most powerful union group in the nation, was caught by surprise and joined the movement late.

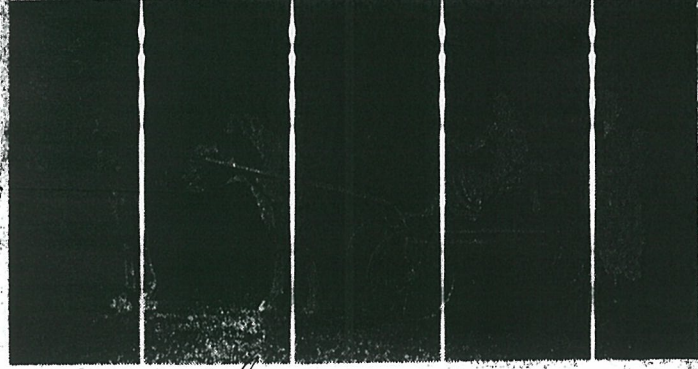

UN Members Will Resist Any New Communist Attack

Renewed Korean War Might Be Carried Into Red China

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — (U.P.) — United Nations members who fought Red aggression today pledged quick resistance to any new Communist attacks and said a renewed Korean war might be carried to Red China territory.

Spokesmen said careful diplomatic consultations would have to precede any go-ahead to strike beyond Korea's borders. They said such action might require a formal U.N. resolution, which they said would be emphasized that there was no advance commitment to hit the Chinese homeland in Friday's 16-nation warning to the Reds.

The general view of the nations who resisted aggression in Korea was that the mere threat of action against Red China might well help to deter the Communists from a rash renewal of the war.

Neutral Asian delegates were far from convinced on the other hand, that the warning was a wise move. They felt that, with a political conference on Korean unification in the offing, this is a poor time to fill the air with warnings. They also suggested that most of the recent talk of renewed fighting has come from South Korean President Syngman Rhee and not from the Communist side.

In general, there is far less optimism here over chances of a Korean much less of a Far East settlement than there was in the days immediately following the truce signing.

Earl Ward To Try For National Driving Honors

Earl M. Ward, Sharon, Pennsylvania's teen-age driving champion, will go to Washington next week to compete for national honors against title holders from other states.

Earl, who is 18, will try for the \$1250 scholarship first prize in the national Road-to-Rome sponsored by U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. Competition will open on Tuesday, Aug. 11, and last through the 16th. The youthful driving expert will be accompanied to the capital by Martin Maloney of Sharpsville, representative of the Shenango Valley Jaycees who are sponsoring Ward in the contest.

Earl is the son of Mrs. Mary Ward, 357 West State St. He won the local Road-to-Rome on June 13 and then annexed the state title at Lancaster on June 27. A display of trophies won by Earl in the local and state contests is on display in the window of the First National Bank in Sharon.

Ohio Becomes Member Of Union

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — President Eisenhower made Ohio a full-fledged member of the Union Friday, just in time it developed to signify the Red-eye State's significant contribution.

The President, who did it along with a big signed into law a bill by Rep. George H. Bender (R-O.), to ratify an alleged overture by Congress in 1952.

That was the year Ohio presented her credentials and Congress, previously skeptical, then, but Bender and research men have shown that the Congress had no choice but to accept Ohio's membership in the Union.

Malenkov Says Russia Now Has Hydrogen Bomb

MOSCOW, (U.P.) — Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov told the Supreme Soviet today that Russia has developed a hydrogen bomb.

The Russian premier made the statement in the course of a speech in which he declared that Russia has become one of the mightiest nations in the world.

Pfc. Janice Thompson, 20, Of Grove City Is Victim

A 21-year-old Grove City girl, a member of the Marine Corps, drowned yesterday in a boating accident at Quantico, Va., where she was stationed.

The victim was Pfc. Janice Lee Thompson, of 231 Lincoln Ave. No details of the accident were available. Her father was notified by a telephone call from the Marine base and was informed that investigations were continuing.

She was a daughter of Raymond and Clara Strusser, of Grove City, and was born in Grove City Sept. 17, 1932. A graduate of Grove City High School, she entered the Marine Corps a year ago last March.

Surviving besides her parents are two sisters, Mrs. Joseph P. New, and Mrs. Gene Yeager, Grove City; a brother, Raymond Thompson Jr., Grove City, and her grandparents, Mrs. John Thompson, R. D. Volant, and Mr. and Mrs. George Latham, Stopeboro.

Truce Commission Gets List Of Dead

MUNSAN, Korea, (U.P.) — The United Nations military armistice commission disclosed today it had received from the Communists a list of prisoners who died in Red camps.

The commission received the list at Panmunjom Friday when the UN command gave the Communists a roster of Reds who had died in Allied compounds.

A spokesman said details must be released by the United Nations command headquarters in Tokyo.

Eisenhower Leave For Vacation Today

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — President Eisenhower whisked through last-minute paper work with a carefree air today as he prepared to shed the heat and frustrations of the capital for a vacation in Colorado.

The first family expected to spend most of its time in Denver at the home of Mrs. John S. Doud, Mrs. Eisenhower's mother. But the President also planned to maintain offices at nearby Lowry Air Force Base and to visit a ranch in the mountains near Fraser.

Mr. Eisenhower helped clear the way for the trip by signing the \$1,000,000 special air program and the \$200,000,000 first installment on South Korean rehabilitation.

Air Force Seeks Funds To Expand Base At Vienna

\$3,000,000, Needed To Establish Fighter-Bomber Wing

The U. S. Air Force plans to spend up to \$3,000,000 at nearby Vienna Airport to establish a fighter-bomber wing for Air Force Reserves—if Congress is willing to provide the funds.

Air Force representatives met yesterday with airport officials and Youngstown city leaders to explain the plan. They said the Air Force wants to establish a reserve training center with a complement of about 2500 men. The group would include about 150 men who would be members of a permanent cadre while the others would receive training mostly on weekends.

The spokesmen said that one, two or three squadrons of the reserve training wing would be activated, depending on the number of reserves willing to take part in the program. It is estimated there are about 10,000 eligible Air Force reserves in the area.

If Congress appropriates the money, the Air Force hopes to establish the base during 1954 and 1955 and get the program started by June 30, 1955.

The Air Force spokesmen said the reserve unit would have about 10 F-84 jet fighters available for training purposes by mid-1955. There would be 400 to 500 operations each month at the training center. An operation is defined as the taking off or landing of an aircraft.

By mid-1956, 30 aircraft would be available with 1300 to 1500 operations a month. And by mid-1957, 30 to 50 aircraft would be available with 1700 to 2000 operations a month.

Last summer the Air Force opened a jet fighter-interceptor base at Vienna Airport and about 1000 officers and men are stationed there at the present time.

E. German Crops Rotting In Fields

BERLIN, (U.P.) — East German Communists commandeered Red army and People's Police trucks today to haul their harvest, now rotting in the fields because of a transport breakdown.

Berliner Zeitung, Communist-edited newspaper, said the lack of transport has become a "serious problem," especially in getting food to the hungry Soviet sector of Berlin and suburban communities.

Dulles And Rhee Agree On Limit To Peace Talks

Will Walk Out After 90 Days If Conference Looks Hopeless

SEOUL, Korea, (U.P.) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and President Syngman Rhee approved a mutual defense treaty today and agreed to walk out of the Korean peace conference together after 90 days if agreement with the Communists appeared hopeless.

But Dulles told a news conference later the joint declaration with Rhee did not mean the United States intended to renew the Korean war automatically if the conference failed.

The U.S.-South Korean defense treaty, the price demanded by Rhee for permitting the Korean armistice, was initiated this morning by Dulles and Rhee.

They issued a joint declaration on their four-day meeting and Dulles held a press conference before he flew to Tokyo for an overnight visit en route back to Washington.

The treaty pledges the United States to come to the aid of the Korean republic if it is again attacked. It also gives the United States the right to base military forces in Korea.

In the treaty are assurances that any United States action would be carried out "in accordance with its constitutional processes"—meaning an act of Congress would be necessary for a declaration of war. The treaty itself also is subject to approval by the Senate.

The joint declaration issued by Dulles and the South Korean president said the United States and Korea will "consult further" if they walk out of the peace talks.

Plans For Hickory Plant Approved

Plans for Hickory Township's sewage disposal plant have been approved by the Pennsylvania Department of Health, according to Joseph Harris, township engineer.

The announcement was made at a meeting of township supervisors last evening at Hermitage fire station.

The next step for the supervisors will be the formation of a five-man authority which will have jurisdiction over the project, sell the bonds and award contracts. It is expected that bids will be sought in October.

The plant will serve approximately 1200 homes in the township immediately east of Wheatland, Farrell and Sharon, north as far as Buhl Farm and east to Hermitage.

The supervisors will meet in special session next Friday evening to name the authority members.

10 North Koreans Sentenced To Die In New Red Purge

Accused Of Planning To Set Up Capitalistic Government

TOKYO, (U.P.) — Communist broadcast said today 10 officials have been sentenced to death for plotting to overthrow the Red North Korean government "on the instigation of the United States."

Pyeongyang Radio, the voice of North Korea, said 13 officials were involved in the plan to install a capitalistic government to replace the Red regime.

The reports said Pak Hung Yong, North Korean vice premier and foreign minister, was slated to head "the new capitalistic government."

Lee Sung Yap, inspector-general of the North Korean People's Council, was named in the broadcast as the ringleader who had been in contact since 1945 with U. S. State Department and counter-intelligence officials.

The North Korean People's Council is the equivalent in Russia of the Supreme Soviet, the parliament.

Radio Moscow said 10 of the 12 were tried for conspiracy and espionage and sentenced to death, including Lee. Two others got prison sentences of 12 and 15 years.

Pak was not among the 12 indicted and the broadcasts did not say what punishment was in store for him. His replacement as foreign minister by Gen. Nam Il, head of the Communist truce delegation, was announced by Pyongyang Radio without explanation last Sunday.

Informed observers in Tokyo believed Premier Kim Il Sung carried out the purge to consolidate his hold over the North Korean people and keep them from "softening up" during the post-truce period.

Senator Malone Injured In Fall

STROUDSBURG, Pa. — (U.P.) — Sen. George W. Malone (R-Nev.) was reported in good condition at Mchiro County General Hospital in East Stroudsburg today where he is being treated for a fractured pelvis.

The senator, who sustained his third serious injury, was injured Thursday when he fell from a horse at a mountain resort here. He and his wife, Katie, decided to stop off at the resort before returning to their home.

A specialist from Pittsburgh examined the senator and placed him in a hospital where the leg was broken. The hospital said the senator was in good condition and would be able to leave the hospital in a few days.

Malone is serving as a member of the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources.

Directors Offer \$200,000 In New Stock, Will Ask For Authority To Borrow

Present Stockholders Will Have First Chance To Buy New Issue; President Garvey Calls Meeting For Oct. 9

Directors of Shenango Inn today moved forward on plans for expansion of the present building with these steps:

1. They offered \$200,000 in new stock, for which present stockholders may subscribe in the next 30 days. Any remaining will be offered non-stockholders.
2. Called a special meeting of the stockholders for Oct. 9, to vote on authorizing borrowing if enough stock is not sold to meet the cost of the new wing.

Details of the plan were contained in a mailing to stockholders which included a letter from President H. J. Garvey, notice of the meeting, copies of resolutions passed by the board, subscription blanks and proxies.

Mr. Garvey, in his letter, told stockholders "good business dictates" expansion, as he outlined the demand on present facilities, pointing out that "from 20 to 50 prospective guests are turned away each night."

He said "each month of operation of present facilities means a loss of an estimated \$3000 in potential profit."

His letter follows: "Shenango Inn, the community hotel you helped create, is bursting at the seams! Its acceptance, far beyond our fondest dreams, makes immediate expansion imperative if we are to serve the community and traveling public adequately and properly protect your present investment. Good business dictates the addition of 30 rooms, a small dining room and other facilities, bids for which are now being taken."

FBI Will Probe \$30,000 Gift

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. has ordered a full FBI investigation into Weiburn Maycock's controversial \$30,000 contribution to the 1948 campaign fund of former President Truman.

Justice Department sources revealed that Brownell told the FBI to check into "all phases of the testimony" of the former legal adviser of the Democratic National Committee.

Maycock told a House committee investigating tax scandals this week that he supplied the contribution from a \$65,000 fee he received for helping a prominent businessman out of his tax woes.

He testified he received a favorable ruling for his client after taking the matter up with John W. Snyder, then secretary of the Treasury.

T-H Law Changes Will Be Approved

PITTSBURGH, (U.P.) — Congress will approve "substantial" changes in the Taft-Hartley Act, which will be "more likeable to representatives of organized labor" according to Secretary of Labor Martin P. Durkin.

Durkin, here Friday to accept an honorary degree of doctor of social sciences from Duquesne University at summer commencement exercises, declined to disclose what the changes in the controversial labor law would be.

President Signs Trade Act Extension

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — President Eisenhower said he believed the present Reciprocal Trade Act was "inadequate in many ways" but he signed a bill extending it until June 30, 1954.

"The bill would provide a 'sunset' clause" to permit the nation to develop new trade policies based on a full knowledge of the world's economic situation and the needs of the American people," the President said.

Clarks Mills Man Killed When Truck Skids Off Road

Father Of Five Dies In Fairview Township Accident

A Clarks Mills man was killed early this morning when the truck in which he was riding skidded off the road in Fairview Township, turned over, going down an embankment and colliding with a tree.

He was James H. Kittenbaugh, father of five children, who was a passenger in the pickup truck of James H. Slater, 23, of R. D. 1, Stoneboro.

Slater, who suffered cuts to the face and a broken left collarbone, was in fair condition in Mercey Cottage Hospital today.

According to state police at the Mercey substation the accident happened at about 5 a. m. while the truck was traveling west on the Krenis road between Routes 19 and 58 north of Mercer. The truck failed to negotiate a sharp turn, rolled down the embankment and hit a tree that is about 25 feet from the edge of the pavement. About \$600 damage was done to the truck. The impact pushed in the roof of the vehicle, trapping the occupants inside. A wrecking crew had to work about half an hour to remove them, police said.

Ohio Youth Plays Dead, Lives As 17 Shots Hit Car

WARREN, O. — Deputies today investigated an attack by a mysterious gunman who fired 17 bullets into a slow moving automobile driven by a Lake Milton youth near neighboring Newton Falls.

Deputy Sheriff John Bluedorn said the bullets were fired into a car driven by James R. Porter, 18, Lake Milton. Bluedorn said that Porter told him the bullets were fired from a long-barreled gun which the gunman had poked out of the opened window of a parked car.

Bluedorn said the bullets left a line of holes extending from the right front door to the rear of Porter's car. He said Porter told him he had escaped the shots by diving into the road and feigning death.

Porter said there were two men in the car from which the shots were fired.

Boy Cuts Head

Daryl Stephens, 2, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Stephens, R. D. 5, Greenville, fell yesterday and received a cut to his scalp which required five stitches when he was treated at Sharon General Hospital.

80 Per Cent Of Workers Under Social Security

25,000,000 Will Get Retirement or Survivors' Benefits

Eighty per cent of all workers in the United States are engaged in employment covered by Social Security and are building an insured status under the old-age and survivors insurance program. Addison B. Henry, manager of the Farrell Social Security office, announced today.

About 25,000,000 workers have been in jobs under Social Security long enough to be assured of retirement benefits for themselves at 65 and survivor benefits for their families. Four out of every five mothers and children are protected under the program in the event of the death of the family breadwinner. Mr. Henry said.

For workers over 65 who retire and for the survivors of workers who die at any age, the old-age and survivors insurance program provides substantial monthly benefits. In those cases where benefits may be based on the average earnings since 1950, the average monthly payment for a retired worker without dependents is about \$65; for an aged couple, somewhat more than \$100; and for a widow with two children, about \$150, according to Mr. Henry.

Since these benefit payments provide such important income for the retired worker and his family and for his survivors in case of his death, each worker, says Mr. Henry, owes it to himself and to his family to know just what his status is in this insurance program; to know what, if any, protection he is providing for himself and for his family through old-age and survivors' insurance. He can best get this information, concluded Mr. Henry by discussing his own personal case at the social security office, 703 Broadway, Farrell.

For the convenience of those living in the Mercer area, a representation of the Farrell Social Security Office will be at the Court House basement assembly room in Mercer, Tuesday, Aug. 11 between 2 and 4 p. m.

Eisenhower Okay's Sale Of Plants

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower has signed legislation authorizing the sale to private enterprise of the government's 28 synthetic rubber plants.

The government built the plants during World War II to offset losses of natural rubber supplies from Southeast Asia. Mr. Eisenhower had recommended that the government dispose of the facilities.

The act creates a disposal commission to negotiate the sale of the plants. The commission will submit a report and the proposed sales plan to Congress by Jan. 31, 1955.

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The White House said the National Security Council and the cabinet will continue its meetings with Vice President Richard M. Nixon presiding during the vacation absence of President Eisenhower.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the council will meet each Thursday and the cabinet will meet on Thursday at the call of Nixon.

Calls Medicine A Key Weapon

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (U.P.)—Dr. Lemuel C. McGee, medical director of the Hercules Powder Co., Wilmington, Del., said Friday that medicine is a key weapon in the fight against Communism.

In an address before company physicians from all parts of the Pennsylvania system, Dr. McGee said "medicine is recognized today as an important and distinguished social instrument. Like food, medicine is a weapon against Communism."

Cuba May End Press Censorship

HAVANA, Cuba (U.P.)—President Fulgencio Batista said Thursday night press censorship in Cuba will be ended "in the not too distant future" and constitutional guarantees restored "probably before the end of 90 days."

He told a press conference of 25 foreign correspondents the government had no alternative to suspending constitutional guarantees following the abortive revolt in east Cuba last July 26.

Batista charged former President Carlos Prío Socarrás with direct responsibility for the revolt.

Prío, overthrown by Batista in March, 1952, and now in exile in Miami, Fla., "is abusing the hospitality" of the United States, the president said.

Batista hinted the recent revolt might force postponement of Cuban elections scheduled for next June.

Tests Completed On New Jet Plane

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The Navy announced today that a new and faster model of its Fury jet fighter, carrier-based version of the Air Force Sabre, has been put through successful flight tests and is going into production.

The FJ-3 Fury, a sweptback wing fighter with improved gunlight and armament, is powered by the British-designed and American-built J-65 Sapphire jet engine, the Navy said. Saphires are rated at 1200 pounds of thrust, more powerful than the engines in any but the latest model Sabres.

Top speed for the new model Fury was not given but it was believed to be in the 650 to 700 mile an hour class. The Navy put it in the "high subsonic speed class." It said the plane has "a striking punch equal to or greater than other carrier fighters."

North American Aviation test pilot Bill Ingram made the initial flights and the plane is "in preliminary stages of production" at the company's Columbus, O., plant.

Linesville Firm Gets Road Contract

HARRISBURG, O.P.—The firm of Paul L. Britton, Inc., Linesville, was awarded a \$311,323 Highway Department contract for work on Traffic Route 957 in Warren County.

The project involves widening and bituminous surfacing of 4.72 miles of roadway in Sugar Grove Borough, Sugar Grove and Farmington Townships. Construction of two reinforced concrete structures over a branch of Stillwater Creek and spanning Kiantone Creek is also included.

Senate Group To Push FEPC Bill

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—A bipartisan bloc of senators will seek action at the next session of Congress on a bill to set up a fair unemployment practices commission, it was learned today.

Sen. Irving M. Ives (R-N.Y.) said hearings on the FEPC bill, sponsored by himself and 17 other senators, will begin early next January. The hearings will be before a Senate labor subcommittee headed by Ives.

The measure is sure to set off a Southern filibuster if it reaches the floor.

Subcommittee Will Tour Army Bases

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—A Senate armed services subcommittee is planning to make an on-the-spot survey of proposed American military bases in Spain.

Chairman Francis Case (R-S.D.) said the subcommittee "probably" will stop in Spain during the course of a fall tour of bases abroad.

Blowout Caused Bus-Car Accident

HYDRO, Okla. (U.P.)—Investigators said a blowout evidently caused a car and a bus to plunge into a 30-foot canyon, killing six persons and injuring 35, including a youth from Monessen, Pa.
