George Lewis becomes Waynesburg immortal

Hickory High School matcoach George Lewis will be one of five former Waynesburg College athletes named to the college Sports Hall of Fame in connection with the 1970 Homecoming Day ceremonies Saturday at the school.

Lewis, who obtained numerous honors during his wrestling and coaching years, will be inducted to the Hall of Fame at ceremonies prior to the kickoff of the Waynesburg and Geneva College grid contest slated for 2 p.m.

The widely known mat mentor, started his outstanding mat career at Farrell High School, where he rolled to three consecutive state championships in 1944, 1945, and 1946.

At Waynesburg, the stellar matman became the first Waynesburg athlete in history to win a national championship when he was crowned the 125.5 pound champion in the 1948 NCAA tournament.

He wrestled under coach Raymond "Buck" Murdock, who was inducted into the Hall of Fame last year and compiled a 27-3-1 record in his collegiate career.

Since taking over the reins at Hickory, the successful coach has had only 1 losing season and is ranked as one of the top scholastic coaches in the country.

Other athletes inducted into the Hall at the same time will be Arnold Koepke and Nick George for football, the late George Karmarkovich for basketball, and George "Sooner" Shelton for track.

Also to be inducted are former coach Dr. James M. Miller, first wrestling coach at the school, and former publicity director John L. (Bris) O'Hara.

A crowd of about 800 fans turned out to see the shortest match of the season, which lasted less than one-half hour. But still there was some excitement.

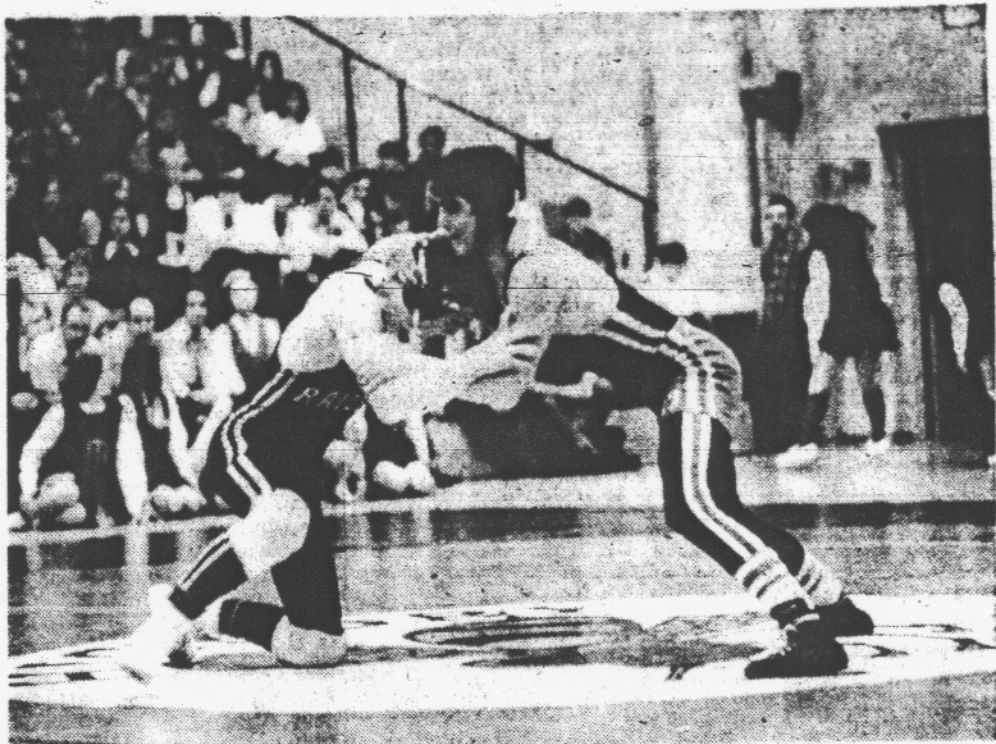

Stottlemyers advance to regional finals Saturday at Clarion

The showing of the 13 Section 3 (Mercer County) champions at the District 10 wrestling tournament in Meadville Saturday fell short of expectations except for Hickory High's hustling Stottlemyer family-duo.

Rande and Rex Stottlemyer, Hickory's terrific brother combination, were the only two District 10 champions from this area as they earned a berth in the Regional championships Saturday at Clarion State College.

Only two survive

Out of the 13 locals entered in the stiff competition, the Stottlemyers were the only wrestlers to survive the two rounds of District competition, although eight county matmen made it to the finals.

And both looked impressive in their victories. Rande, sophomore sensation of the Hornets, won his title at 103 pounds with ease as he tore up Bruce Rial of Franklin, 11-2, in the first match then controlled Fairview's Garrett Headley for a 6-0 decision in the finals.

2nd District crown

It was the second straight District title for Rande who won at 88 last season. The super-soph has compiled a career record of 33-1 in his two years for Hickory.

His older brother Rex at 133 wasn't to be outdone as he chalked up two pins in his bouts.

The first match against highly ranked Dan Ignasiak was a real thriller before Rex nailed his opponent to the mats late in the third period. After some fast moving action and a disputed referee's call, Rex was down 9-4 going into the third period.

Comes back to win

But the determined Hornet bounced right back in the final frame to take a 12-11 lead and work Ignasiak into the pinning position before the bout ended. It was Ignasiak's third year at Districts.

The final round proved much easier for the senior Stottlemyer as he took down his Meadville foe Don Knightlinger and pinned him in the first period.

Doug Weaver of Greenville looked good in ripping Gary Schubert of Cranberry, 16-5, in his first match. In the finals he put out a determined effort but lost to Union City's standout Chris Clark, 4-2. Clark won the regional title last season.
